**On July 24<sup>th</sup>, Delaware Riverkeeper Network Premieres  
Final Installment of Shale Truth Interview Series  
with Energy Expert Arthur Berman (Pt. 6)**

*Bristol, PA* - Delaware Riverkeeper Network will present the sixth installment of its Shale Truth Interview series this Wednesday, July 24<sup>th</sup>, when energy industry analyst Arthur Berman discusses concerns the public should have over the future use of natural gas. Mr. Berman will also discuss the apathy he's experienced among lawmakers and government officials when he has challenged the industry claims that natural gas is a cheap, abundant energy source.

This will be the last segment featuring Mr. Berman, who is an oil industry analyst with Labyrinth Consulting Services. Next week the Shale Truth series will begin a discussion with Leslie Sauer of Andropogon Associates. Ms. Sauer is an expert on landscape restoration; she will discuss the habitat destruction caused by shale gas pipeline construction, and steps that can be taken to reduce the impacts of pipeline installations.

Cornell University Professor Anthony Ingraffea has also been interviewed. Dr. Ingraffea has debunked industry claims that shale gas is a cleaner alternative fuel source similar to solar and wind power. Dr. Ingraffea will discuss the true pollution load from shale gas operations.

The Delaware Riverkeeper Network is presenting these videos to inform the public about how shale gas extraction pollutes the air and water, destroys forests and wetlands, and ruins the quality of life in many communities. The gas industry has claimed natural gas is a cheap, abundant energy source.
