Cornell University Professor Anthony Ingraffea has also been interviewed. Dr. Ingraffea has debunked industry claims that shale gas is a cleaner alternative fuel source similar to solar and wind power. Dr. Ingraffea discusses the true pollution load from shale gas operations.
